

- Our Palm Sunday celebration leads us into Jesus' Passion and **Holy Week**. We hope you will join us online this week as we pause to observe these solemn days. During worship on Thursday and Saturday—as well as Easter Sunday—we encourage you to have **bread and juice on hand** as we share in the Lord's Supper from our homes.
- Our **Maundy Thursday Tenebrae** service, with Communion, will take place online Thursday, April 1 at 7:30 p.m.
- Our online **Good Friday service** on Friday, April 2 at 7:30 p.m. will include the pastors sharing short meditations on the Seven Last Words of Christ.
- The **Easter Vigil** on Saturday, April 3 will take place via Zoom at 8:00 p.m. and will include the celebration of Communion. For the vigil we invite you to have on hand a candle, a noisemaker, a small bowl of water, and bread and juice (for details, see www.fourthchurch.org/lent-easter). **The vigil will take place only via Zoom;** for the link, sign up at www.bit.ly/eastervigil21
- Our **festive Easter service online** will include Communion as well as the joyous music of brass and organ, handbells and jazz, and the hymns of Easter. This online celebration of the resurrection takes place next Sunday, April 4 at 11:00 a.m. We hope you and those you know will not only mark this and the Holy Week dates on your calendars but also **invite others to join us in worship online** as our journey takes us to the cross and eventually the empty tomb!

Jesus lies down on the donkey's back, steeling himself before his journey through the palms. He has a target on his back—he's a disruption to the status quo upheld by the Pharisees and chief priests and a threat to the power of the empire. His friend Lazarus is caught up in it all too. I imagine as Jesus closes his eyes and strokes the donkey's hair, he hears the anguish in Mary and Martha's voices as they cried out to him, wondering why he took so long. I imagine he smells the pungent fragrance of the burial perfume poured on his feet, bringing into clarity the reality of his impending death. I imagine he sees the judgment on Judas's face as Jesus was scrutinized for wasting perfume and neglecting those in desperate need.

Jesus plans to enter the city in a way that symbolically subverts power, taking a route opposite of the military leaders who oversee the festival celebrations. His entry would make a definitive statement, imaging an alternative kind of power, a servant leader riding a humble donkey. He knew this act would inch him closer to state-sanctioned torture and death.

We are in a time when we need to draw on courage to call into question the structures that uphold systems of oppression. We are in a time when we need to subvert the powerful and protect the vulnerable. The crowds close in on Jesus. Some lift their hands in praise; others point accusingly. I hope this image serves as a reminder to call upon God for the courage you need, to rest and recharge for the work ahead. But I hope it also heartens you to move forward in courage, even in the midst of great resistance, toward the work God is calling you into.

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
