

On the Fourth Church campus, including in worship, everyone is required to wear masks, fully covering the nose and mouth, Anyone not vaccinated against COVID-19 is also required to practice social distancing. ** For those worshiping with us in person, we are not checking vaccination status, but by entering the Fourth Church campus you certify that (a) you do not currently have COVID-19; (b) you are not experiencing COVID symptoms; (c) you have no reason to quarantine; and (d) you will practice social distancing if you are not vaccinated against COVID-19.



If you would like to join us for in-person worship, we gather for a 10:00 a.m. service in the Sanctuary and a 4:00 p.m. Jazz at Four service in Buchanan Chapel. ** In the Sanctuary, the front section is for those required to or choosing to practice social distancing. The remainder of the Sanctuary is open seating. Seating for Jazz at Four is set up for social distancing. ** The congregation is invited to sing while masked. We encourage those who are concerned about being near those who are singing to consider the socially distanced seating section or join those who worship with us from home via livestream. ** Nursery care is not available at this time. ** Worship can be heard in the Sanctuary and Chapel through the "T" or "T-coil" setting of hearing aids. ** Please silence electronic devices when in the Sanctuary or Chapel. ** On Sundays the doors open for worship at 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. For the morning service, access is by the Michigan Avenue doors to the Sanctuary and the Delaware doors to the Gratz Center. For the Jazz at Four service, access is only by the Delaware doors. ** Sunday parking* is available at 900 N. Michigan (access from Rush or Walton) at the rate of \$9 between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. and at the Hancock garage (875 N. Michigan, enter from Delaware or Chestnut) at the rate of \$10 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Validation tickets for the garages must be picked up from an usher.

Worship Notes

THE COMPOSER OF THE REQUIEM being sung this morning, Gabriel Fauré (1845–1924), began composing the work in 1887, following the death of his parents, and completed it in 1890. Based on the Roman Catholic Mass for the Dead, it is in seven sections. Fauré wrote, "It has been said that my Requiem does not express the fear of death, and someone has called it a lullaby of death. But it is thus that I see death: as a happy deliverance, an aspiration towards happiness above, rather than as a painful experience." The Requiem was later sung at Fauré's own memorial.

THE ORDINARY TIME BANNERS, commissioned for our 150th anniversary, evoke this congregation's call to be a light in the city. The pulpit parament, incorporating a map of Chicago, is created from 150 pieces, one for each year of our history. The use of blue and green represents Lake Michigan and the prairie surrounding the city, while the hanging banners offer images of local wildflowers.
