News and Opportunities

We are glad to have you with us today and hope you will explore the many opportunities for learning, serving, and community building at Fourth Presbyterian Church! * Inspired by the radical hospitality of Jesus Christ, we welcome everyone, without exception, into the life of this congregation. * We invite you to join us at this intersection of faith and life as we share God's grace with one another and the world through worship and ministries of healing, reconciliation, and justice.



On the Fourth Church campus, including in worship, everyone is required to wear masks, fully covering the nose and mouth. * For those worshiping with us in person, we are not checking vaccination status, but by entering the Fourth Church campus you certify that (a) you do not currently have COVID-19; (b) you are not experiencing COVID symptoms; (c) you have no reason to quarantine; and (d) you will practice social distancing if you are not vaccinated against COVID-19.



If you like to join us for in-person worship, we gather each Sunday for a 10:00 a.m. service in the Sanctuary and a 4:00 p.m. Jazz at Four service in Buchanan Chapel. * Seating in the Chapel is set up for social distancing. In the Sanctuary, the front section is for those required to or choosing to practice social distancing. The remainder of the Sanctuary is open seating. * Worshipers are invited to sing while masked. We invite those who are concerned about being near those who are singing to worship with us from home via our 10:00 a.m. livestream, which is also available for viewing later in the week, or our weekly "Rhythm and Word" videos. * Worship in the Chapel can be heard through hearing aids' "T" or "T-coil" setting. * Please silence electronic devices when in the Chapel. * The doors open for worship on Sundays at 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. For the 4:00 service, access is only by the Delaware doors to the Gratz Center. * Sunday parking is available at 900 N. Michigan (access from Rush or Walton) at the rate of \$9 between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Validation tickets for the garage must be picked up from an usher.



For those who prefer to worship online or are unable to join us in person, we livestream our morning worship service at 10:00 a.m. at www.bit.ly/FPCworship and YouTube (www.bit.ly/fpcvideos). (The prelude begins at approximately 9:45 a.m.) The service is also available for viewing afterwards. * Those without Internet access are invited to listen to the morning service via phone by calling 888.916.9166 at the time of the service. * During the week we make the service and sermon available via podcast on iTunes and Spotify (www.bit.ly/FPCpodcast). * Each week we release a new video in our Advent "Rhythm and Word: Midweek Music and Prayer" series, a brief worship experience weaving together scripture, prayer, and music offered by the Fourth Church Jazz Quartet. You can subscribe to our YouTube channel (www.bit.ly/fpcvideos) and watch the videos there on Wednesday evenings or anytime during the week or receive them by email (sign up at www.bit.ly/rhythmandwordemail).

You can find it at fourthchurch.org/podcast * Our Festival of Advent Lessons and Carols returns next Sunday, December 12 at 6:30 p.m. (*in person and livestreamed*), when we will hear readings for the season and sing together favorite Advent hymns. * The annual Christmas with Tower Brass concert will take place Saturday, December 18 at 5:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary and will also be livestreamed. * The Longest Night service, for those experiencing grief and sadness, will be Tuesday, December 21 at 6:30 p.m. (*in person only*).

Our Christmas worship this year will include a variety of in-person and online services: The **Children's Pageant**, which will be online only, streamed on Friday, December 24 at 4:00 p.m. * Our **Christmas Eve Family Service** at 6:00 p.m. (*in person only*); seating will be socially distanced. * Two **Christmas Eve Lessons and Carols** services, one at 8:00 p.m. (*in person and livestreamed*) and one at 10:00 p.m. (*in person only*). There will be no socially distanced seating at either 8:00 or 10:00 p.m., so we invite those who desire social distancing to worship with us at 6:00. For health reasons, at all three in-person services on Christmas Eve we will be using battery-operated tea lights rather than lit candles during "Silent Night" so that worshipers do not have to blow out candles. * Our **Christmas Day Service** on Saturday, December 25 at 10:00 a.m. (*in person only; those who would like an online worship opportunity on Christmas Day are invited to watch the online Christmas Day service from last year or the Christmas Eve service).*
