This morning we conclude our four-session class on "The 1619 Project," discussing slavery's continuing legacy of injustice and inequality. It takes place at 11:15 a.m. in Buchanan Chapel (seating is socially distanced) and via Zoom. Guest speakers have been leading conversation about the history of slavery; cultural and religious practices brought to America from Africa; the history of the Great Migration in Chicago; the 1919 race riot and its origins; and present-day socioeconomic struggles in America's and Chicago's Black community. Today's speaker is Bradford Hunt, History Department Chair at Loyola University.



The Mark Lomax Quartet will be in concert at Fourth Church this Friday, February 4 at 7:30 p.m. Their performance of "**Let There Be Light**" will welcome in-person attendance as well as be livestreamed on our YouTube channel (*www.bit.ly/fpcvideos*). "Let There Be Light" was written by Dr. Lomax, a critically acclaimed composer, recording artist, and drummer. He is also an activist and educator specializing in the sociopolitical and spiritual aspects of African American art, music, and race, as well as the role of the arts in building community. A seven-movement tone poem inspired by the biblical creation story found in Genesis, "Let There Be Light" is presented through an aleatoric compositional technique that presents unstructured themes to the musicians, who interpret them in real time based on the macro narrative of the work. Each of the themes suggests a soundscape particular to each day of creation and evolves as a collective artistic creation to reflect the act of divine creation. ***** Our **Friday Noonday Concerts** continue this week with our flutist **Elise Blatchford and pianist Maria Lyapkova** presenting the in-person concert at 12:10 p.m. on Friday, February 4. Scholtes was very involved in the civil rights movement of the 1960s and needed something for his youth choir to sing at ecumenical, interracial events. Finding nothing that fit his needs, he wrote this hymn in a single day.
