
Prayer for the Day

Then if Satan on us press, flesh or spirit to assail, victor in the wilderness, grant that we not faint nor fail!


So shall we have peace divine: holier gladness ours shall be; round us, too, shall angels shine, such as served you faithfully.

Worship Notes

It is estimated that the hymn following today's homily, "Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound," is sung more than 10 million times each year, making it one of the most popular Christian hymns. The text was written in 1772 by John Newton (1725–1807), who grew up without any religious conviction and became a ship's captain involved in the Atlantic trade of enslaved people. In 1748, during a storm at sea, he called out to God for help and, in this moment of redemption, had a spiritual conversion. In 1764 he was ordained an Anglican priest and wrote the text of "Amazing Grace" to illustrate a sermon on New Year's Day 1773. In 1835 the text became associated with tune "New Britain," with which it is most frequently sung today.
