We are glad to be worshiping with you today and hope you will explore the many opportunities for learning, serving, and community building at Fourth Church! * Inspired by the radical hospitality of Jesus Christ, we welcome everyone, without exception, into the life of this congregation. * We invite you to join us at this intersection of faith and life as we share God's grace with one another and the world through worship and ministries of healing, reconciliation, and justice.



On the Fourth Church campus, **masks are welcome but not required.** As a mask-welcoming campus we affirm that mask wearing continues to be an effective preventative measure for individuals. Thus we not only encourage the wearing of masks by anyone who wants or needs to wear one, but we are also committed to ensuring no one will feel out of place should they choose to wear a mask while at the church. ***** Since some populations are more vulnerable to COVID-19 than others, some programs on our campus may still choose to require masks. ***** Additionally, we are continuing our practice of not checking vaccination status, but **anyone coming on site certifies** by doing so that (a) they do not currently have COVID-19; (b) they are not experiencing COVID symptoms; (c) they have no reason to quarantine; and (d) they will wear a mask and practice social distancing if they are not vaccinated against COVID-19. ***** We are **singing during worship**. We invite those who are concerned about others singing unmasked to either worship with us, masked, in the socially distanced seating section or join us in worshiping online. ***** In the Sanctuary, the **front section on the pulpit side is for those required to wear a mask.** The remainder of the Sanctuary is open seating. Seating for Jazz at Four is all socially distanced.



For those who prefer to worship online or who are unable to join us in person, we livestream our morning service at 10:00 a.m. on our YouTube channel (www.bit.ly/fpcvideos), where the service is also available for viewing afterwards. **** Those without Internet access** are invited to listen to the morning service via phone by calling 888.916.9166 at the time of the service. ****** During the week we make the service and sermon available via podcast on iTunes as well as Spotify (www.bit.ly/FPCpodcast).

If you would like to join us for in-person worship, we gather each Sunday for a 10:00 a.m. service in the Sanctuary (except for Easter Sunday, when we will gather at 9:00 and 11:00 a.m.) and a 4:00 p.m. Jazz at Four service in Buchanan Chapel. ** On Sundays the doors open for worship a half hour prior to the service. For the Jazz at Four service, access is only by the Delaware doors to the Gratz Center. ** Sunday parking is available at 900 N. Michigan (access from Rush or Walton) at the rate of \$9 for 6 hours between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. (and \$18 for up to 12 hours) and at the Hancock garage (875 N. Michigan, enter from Delaware or Chestnut) at the rate of \$10 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Validation tickets for the garages must be picked up from an usher. ** Nursery care is not available at this time. ** Worship can be heard in the Sanctuary and Chapel through the "T" or "T-coil" setting of hearing aids. ** Please silence electronic devices when in the Sanctuary or Chapel.



Each Sunday during Lent we are **extinguishing a candle** at the front of the Sanctuary. Just as we lit candles on the Advent wreath to symbolize the light coming into the world through the birth of Christ, so now our extinguishing of candles points to the Lenten progression from light to the shadows of Good Friday and the crucifixion. **** The season of Lent** calls Christians to embrace the **faith journey** by reflecting upon and deepening their relationship with God and by acting upon their Christian beliefs. During this season, we are invited to thoughtfully take up the **gifts of faith**—worship, study, prayer, and service—in preparation for Holy Week and Christ's journey to the cross. ****** In this season of self-reflection and prayer, we invite you to use our **Holy Week and Easter devotions as a resource for meditation and reflection**. To receive the meditations daily via email, simply subscribe at www.bit.ly/fpcdevotions. ****** Also available for your reflection is our **Lenten "Rhythm and Word" video series.** These brief worship experiences weaving together scripture, prayer, and blues music can be found on our YouTube channel (*www.bit.ly/fpcvideos*).



Following worship, Deacons are available in Stone Chapel (through the door to the right of the pulpit) to pray with **individuals who would like to offer prayers** of praise or concern. ***** On Wednesdays we gather at 9:30 a.m. for **Morning Prayer via Zoom** and at 10:00 a.m. for **in-person Morning Prayer** in Buchanan Chapel. The chapel is open for **opportunity to walk the labyrinth** between 9:00 and 9:45 a.m. on Wednesdays and between 9:00 and 10:00 a.m. on Thursdays. Today's Palm Sunday celebration will then lead us into Jesus' Passion and to **Holy Week**. We invite you to join us in pausing to observe those solemn days.



On Wednesday evening, April 13 we will release our Holy Week "Rhythm and Word" video. This brief worship experience weaves together scripture, prayer, and blues music and can be found after 6:00 p.m. Wednesday on our YouTube channel (*www.bit.ly/fpcvideos*). ** On Maundy Thursday, April 14, we will gather in the Sanctuary for a 12:10 p.m. Communion service and a 7:30 p.m. Tenebrae service, also with Communion. This evening service follows the ancient Office of Tenebrae (from the Latin for "shadows"). The service portrays the progression from light to darkness in the passion of Jesus, beginning with his abandonment on Thursday and concluding with his crucifixion. The service ends with the Sanctuary in complete darkness." The 7:30 p.m. Tenebrae service will be livestreamed on our YouTube channel. ** On April 15 we will observe Good Friday with a Good Friday service at 12:10 p.m. in the Sanctuary; a 5:30 p.m. program in Buchanan Chapel for children and families; and a 7:30 p.m. Choral Service featuring the Morning Choir singing "The Seven Last Words of Christ" by Théodore Dubois; the 7:30 p.m. choral service will be livestreamed on YouTube.



We hope you will join us on **Easter Sunday** for our joyous celebration of the resurrection!
