

Tolling of the Bells

The bells toll thirty-three times, once for each year of Jesus' life on earth. When the bells cease, the congregation departs in silence.

There is no benediction or postlude this day. Our watch continues into the night and the empty tomb.

One: Almighty God, look with mercy on your family, for whom our Lord Jesus Christ was willing to be betrayed and to be given over to the hands of sinners and to suffer death on the cross; who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen.

THE PERFORMANCE OF THE STABAT MATER this evening includes members of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago thanks to a generous donation by Tom and Judith Monroe, given in loving memory of John M. and Sue Buchanan.

- FRANZ JOSEF HAYDN (1732–1809) set the *Stabat Mater* sequence in 1767 as his first major sacred composition. The first performance was on Good Friday of 1767, at Eszterhaza, his employer's palace in Hungary. The phrase "Stabat Mater Dolorosa" means "the sorrowful mother was standing" and refers to the biblical scene of the virgin Mary weeping at the foot of the cross where her son was crucified.

A NOTE ON HOLY WEEK AND ANTISEMITISM: The Passion texts can pose problems for Christian-Jewish relations. For centuries, many Christians blamed "The Jews" for Christ's death. This interpretation is incorrect, misguided, and dangerous. In fact, crucifixion was solely a Roman form of punishment, one used to frighten subjugated peoples into obeying Roman authority. Tragically, Christians have misused the reading of the Passion to foment violent antisemitic pogroms. Antisemitism still plagues the world. We read these texts with sensitivity and caution, remembering the cruelties and failures of our past.



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
