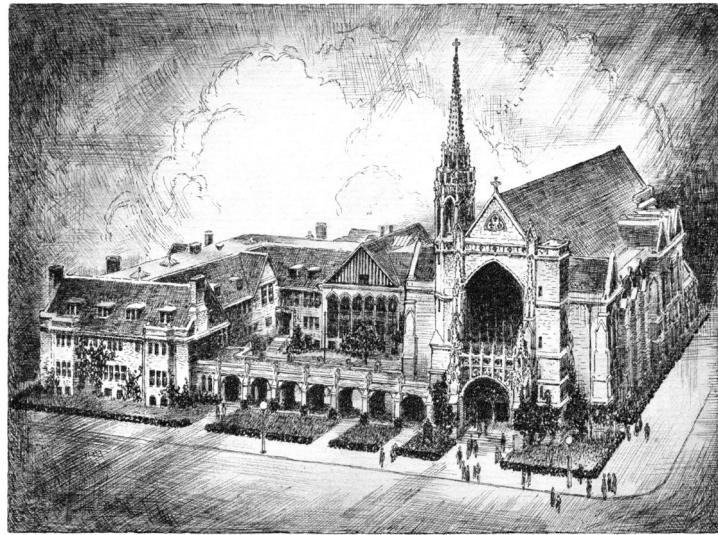

THE SERMON HYMN “Mothering God, You Gave Me Birth,” is based on images from the writings of the English medieval mystic, Julian of Norwich. Her writings, which are the earliest surviving works in English attributed to a woman, reflect a theology of God’s love that was shaped by Julian’s sixteen visions of Jesus. She experienced them in 1373 when, in her thirties, she was deathly ill and received last rites. Recovering to live into her seventies, Julian of Norwich is known to many from these words in her book *Revelations of Divine Love*: “All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well.”
