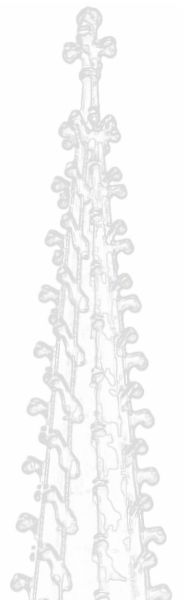

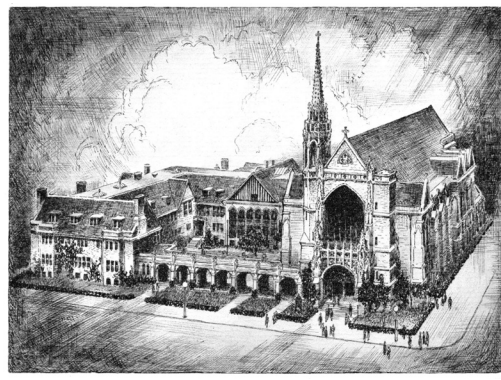
Today is Reformation Sunday,

a day when we recall the rich heritage of the Protestant tradition and give thanks for Reformation leaders and all others who have kept the faith. The Presbyterian Church (USA) grew out of the Reformation of the sixteenth century under leaders such as John Calvin and John Knox.

The last Sunday in October has been chosen as Reformation Sunday because it was on October 31, 1517, that Martin Luther is said to have posted his ninety-five theses on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany, the watershed event sparking the Reformation.

He later authored today's opening hymn, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

The use of bagpipes for the recessional also points to the Reformation, reminding us of Knox and the Scottish roots of the Presbyterian church. Our red banners, paraments, and pastors' stoles symbolize the Holy Spirit's ongoing work in reforming the church.
