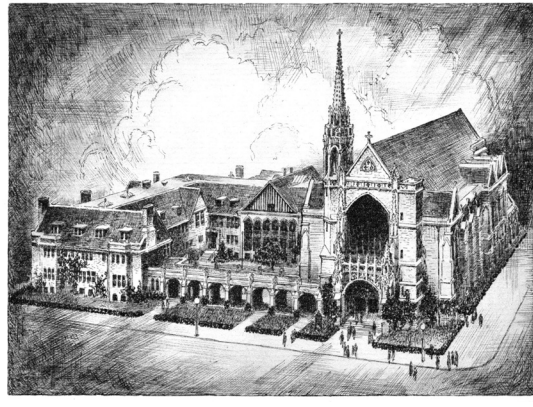

Michigan (*access from Rush or Walton; online payment only*) for \$10 for up to 6 hours between 7:30 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. when using the Metropolis Parking app (*iPhone*) or metropolis.io/join (*Android*) to scan the discount QR code at left no more than 10 minutes before leaving the garage. The code is also available on cards from the ushers; you might leave a card in your car for future Sunday use.

Sunday parking is available at the Hancock garage (*enter from Delaware or Chestnut*) for \$10 between 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. by using a validation ticket from the ushers.
