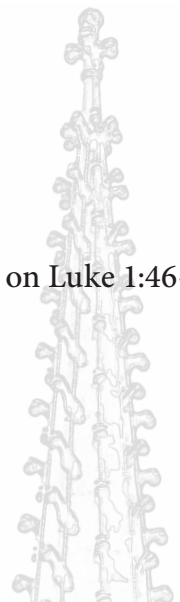

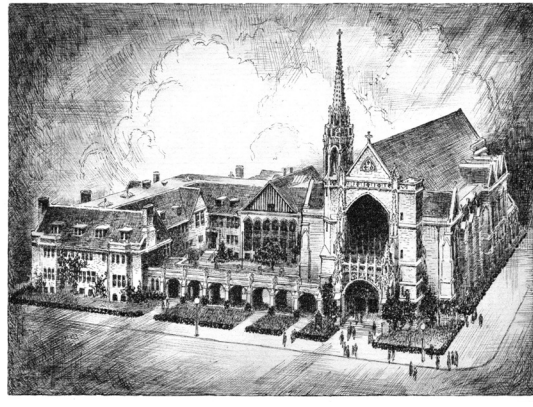

Worshipping in Person at Fourth Church
